A BOOK REVIEW ON SUNDRA RAJOO, "LAW, PRACTICE AND PROCEDURE OF ARBITRATION IN INDIA" (THOMSON REUTERS, 2021)

ABSTRACT

India's significance for international commerce requires no evidence. India is also blessed by a rich arbitration history, but the trajectory of its arbitration law has been described over the years as "one step forward, two steps back."
